During this interim time, specifically the last 5 months, we have noticed that there is new energy and excitement about the possibilities that are before us. There is more connection and we are grateful for the work Peter is doing to connect with people, connect people with people, and connect people with the church. He has also helped many of us identify and accomplish things that we did not think we could do. He has shown us what active listening looks like and has brought people together in small groups to work on specific issues. Peter has led the council in two retreats to help us identify who we are as this body of Christ and start pondering how we see ourselves moving forward into the future.

This last retreat we continued to focus on some core issues that will help us better understand who we are and what we are called to do as a church.

In small groups and in the full council we came up with the following:

WE BELIEVE:

- > We are in a transformative time.
- ➤ God is in the process and has a plan for our church.
- ➤ Each of us is a part of the body of Christ, has unique abilities, and we can use those abilities for the glory of God.
- > We are a community of believers who can make a greater impact collectively, rather than individually.

WE WONDER:

- ➤ What would happen if we listened more carefully in order to hear God's plan for our church.
- ➤ How our church fits into our changing community and world.
- ➤ If there are unmet spiritual needs in our area that we can help meet.
- ➤ What it would take for the people of our church to help meet those needs.

WE NEED YOU:

- ➤ To join in the wondering.
- > To be open to whatever changes God's plan has for us.
- > To think outside the box and be flexible in your thinking.
- To identify your own gifts and abilities and how you can use them to contribute to the mission of the church and be supportive of the gifts of others.

We share these with you to bring you into the conversation. We invite YOU join us in wondering, exploring, and fulfilling God's plan. Your active participation is key to our success.

An Invitation from the Diversity Task Force of the Church Council

For the past three months, we have been meeting as a small task group formed by the Church Council to learn more about what the Bible has to say about diversity and welcoming all as beloved children of God. While our conversations initially focused on sexual orientation, we have also read materials on gender identity, marriage and what it might mean to be a community that welcomes all of us in our diverse experiences.

Through our study and conversations these past months we are all better informed and want to learn more with you. We have learned about the experiences of others that are different than our own. We have grown in our empathy and care. We have learned about making a safe and brave space for conversation about topics that we disagree on.

We believe that we are called to love our neighbor as ourselves. We believe we are called to do unto others as we would have others do unto us. We believe that we all are welcome to Christ's table and that in our baptisms that we are reminded that we are all God's beloved. We believe by engaging in these conversations together we can grow as a people and a church. We know that we want to have a conversation about topics we might not agree on and that we need to make a safe space where all views are welcome and respected. We want to learn to listen and speak as a community of love to and with one another.

A short pamphlet "Homosexuality and the Bible" by Biblical scholar Walter Wink will be a resource for our conversations.

We will be meeting in a hybrid format (on zoom and in person) after church on these days. We want to include you but if you can't attend - let us know a day and time that might work for you and we will hope to gather another mid-week group together.

Title: Loving Our Neighbor: A Conversation on the Church, Bible and Diversity.

Goal of the conversations: To promote a conversation on diversity for the sake of being a more welcoming community for all. To learn more about the role of the Bible in shaping our lives and decisions. To learn about the experience of others and so challenge ourselves and grow in our understanding and faith in order to see all people as beloved children of God.

Timeline: 45 minute sessions after church from 11:30-12:15: April 23, 30, May 7, 14 and 21. We are open to having an alternate time to meet as well. Let us know if that would be more convenient for you.

- April 16: Introduction: Why are we offering this series of conversations? Why do we think this is important? What are our goals for this conversation? Sharing our stories.
- April 23: "Made in God's Image" Bodies and the Bible.

Together we'll create a safe and brave space for conversation.

What does it mean that we are "made in God's image?"

How do we read and understand scripture?

How might we talk about the gifts we have received and our own struggles of being embodied persons and being "made in God's image"?

What questions do you bring?

Why might we talk about our experience as embodied persons at church?

An Invitation from the Diversity Task Force of the Church Council (Cont.)

April 30: The Language of Embodiment (our various experience as people with bodies)

How have the terms for our experiences changed over time?

A great time to bring your questions about the expressions and representations of who we are and how they change.

An orientation to the words we will be using and discussing.

May 7: Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and the Bible

What is sexual orientation?

Why might it be helpful to talk about?

What does the Bible say about sexual orientation and being beloved children of God?

What does the Bible say about marriage?

May 14: Gender Identity and the Bible

What is gender identity?

Why talk about it?

What does the Bible say about gender identity?

May 21: Where do I stand? Where do we stand?

Tolerance, Respect, Open, Affirming, Advocate, Ally?

How do we individually and as a community relate to each other in our diversity and difference?

What might it mean to be a welcoming congregation? Or not?

Why might we want to be? Or not?

Where do we hear God's call?

Where then do we go from here? What are our next steps?

We have other conversations we want to have as well about our embodied experience including reproductive rights, neurodivergence (including autism and Asperger Syndrome), race and class. We hope you will join us as we continue to learn and explore what it means to be the body of Christ and beloved children of God.

A \$10,000 gift was given this week from the Green Living Trust to the church in memory of Rev. Wilbur and Dolores Green after passing away in January. Mrs. Green passed in 2020. The Rev. Green began his ministry at this church on July 15, 1958. He was ordained and installed on October 12, 1958 and served until 1962. Young and dedicated church workers, Rev. and Mrs. Green gave great attention to the families of the congregation. Both became deeply involved in the spiritual life of the church, its organizations and outreach. In 1961 during his tenure the church took up the proposal to become a member of the United Church of Christ and at a special meeting on March 19th of the same year, a vote was taken to approve: 59 Yes and 45 No. At his departure, church membership numbered 313.

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Each week we'll gather to share what Good News, what Hopeful Word, what Good Questions and Challenges we hear in each chapter. Our goal is not to convince anyone of anything or change anyone's opinion (I've never been successful at that!) but to wonder and inquire together on what it means to be the Community of Christ, The Body of Christ in the world today. Debra Rienstra believes that small communities have a particularly critical role to play as a life-giving power for transformation and renewal in the world. What do you think? Come and join us in making a safe space, a brave space, to learn, wonder and grow in our faith together.

How can you participate? So many ways!

- 1) There is a book to read for those who would like to. I can order a copy for you and it is also available on Audiobook and Kindle.
- 2) Or you can read the study guide and questions for each week. Ask me for a copy or pick one up on Sunday.
- 3) Or you can just come for soup, bread and conversation and skip the reading. Each week we'll provide a short summary of the book and you'll be able to jump right into the conversation.

From the Flycover:

Refugia Faith explores how Christian spirituality and practice must adapt to life on a climatealtered planet.

Refugia (reh-FU-jee-ah) is a biological term describing places of shelter where life endures in times of crisis, such as volcanic disruption, fire, or stressed environment. Ideally, these refugia endure, expand, and connect so that new life emerges.

In this book, Debra Rienstra asks: In this era of ecological devastation, how can Christians become people of refugia? How can we find and nurture these refugia in the earth, our human cultural systems, and our spiritual lives? How can we apply all our love and creativity to this task as never before?

By weaving nature writing, personal narrative, and theological reflection, Rienstra proposes a way to transform Christian spirituality and practice, become a healer of the damaged earth, and inspire others to do the same.

Debra Rienstra is a professor of English at Calvin University, where she has taught since 1996, specializing in early British literature and creative writing. She is the author of <u>Worship Words: Discipling Language for Faith Ministry, So Much More: An Invitation to Christian Spirituality, and Great with Child: On Faith, Fullness and Becoming a Mother.</u>

A Worship Series for the Season of Lent: "Seeking: Honest Questions for Deeper Faith"

This Lenten Season we are grateful for collaborating with "A Sanctified Art" Worship Resource to provide a Lenten Worship Series focused on Questions of Faith. This Lenten Season, we will read many stories of Jesus encountering people who are seeking: a new beginning, a different life, a deeper faith. In these interactions, assumptions are disrupted, a new perspective is revealed, mystery grows.

Like the characters in our Lenten scriptures, we are also seeking many things in our own lives and our life together as church. We are listening for the leading and guidance of the Holy Spirit as we discern the way forward as individuals and as a community of faith. This Lent we are all invited to engage in the spiritual practice of seeking - by asking questions, and by staying open, curious and nimble. We hope that this season for all of us will soften our assumptions and expand our perspectives. We pray that these questions will create a safe space to explore - to be drawn more deeply into the fullness of life, into the heart of God.



A Brief Recap of the 220th Annual Business Meeting – February 19, 2023

Phil Krill introduced Ken Kinder of Stifel Nicolaus, investment advisor, to present the financial report of the Trust Funds for 2022. Ken was thankful to see the many familiar friendly faces. Ken reported that the market in December of 2021 was at an all-time high and it was expected that a market correction would take place in 2022, but the market continued to fall as a direct response of the actions of the Federal Reserve. Looking at where we are in this moment and where the markets are is exactly where the church's portfolio is supposed to be and is in line of where we've been all along. There has been a 7.38% compounded gain over time (13 years) which is precisely the return that is wanted in a portfolio. Ken assures that the assets continue to rise, things are okay and the investments are sound and that no major shift or change is needed. Ken continues the careful management of the portfolio with high quality stocks and bonds; US companies who have performed well and have stood the test of time. Ken's plan is to stay the course!

The 2023 proposed budget was presented: \$189,662 in income and \$215,600 in expenses for a deficit of \$25,938. Phil Krill reported much thought and prayer had gone into the building of the budget. A new task force (introduced earlier during worship) was created by the council to address the original \$34,900 gap. Phil reported that progress has already been made as there was an increase in pledges of \$8,962 since the publishing of the Annual Report. After a second presentation from the task force with views and plans for the upcoming year, there was little discussion. Mary Menzies made a motion to approve the budget as presented by the council. Linda Warden seconded. There was no further discussion. All were in favor of approving the 2023 budget as presented. Alice Muh gave appreciation and expressed how impressed she was with the congregation's generosity for special offerings in 2022.

The Council recommended the slate of officers for 2023: Alice Muh, Moderator (1st year, 1st term); Dan Kiefer, Vice-Moderator (1st year, 1st term); Joyce Krill, Treasurer (1st year, 2nd term); Rachel Clark, Assistant Treasurer (1st year, 2nd term). Dudley Bailey made a motion to accept the slate of officers as presented. Tina Peabody seconded and all were in favor. Mary Menzies expressed many thanks to all who serve. Peter, on behalf of the congregation, gave thanks to Tim Gould for his three years as Moderator during unprecedented times that included a pandemic and a pastor retiring.

There was a short presentation from the newly formed Diversity Task Force who had met six times to learn more about what the Bible has to say about diversity. They extended an invitation to the congregation to share what they have learned in a safe and respectful place to express thoughts. (See more on pages 5 and 6 of this newsletter.) Alice Muh brought attention to page 21 of the Annual Report (committee nominating report) and invited people to sign up to serve on a committee by contacting the chairperson. She will be calling on the committees to meet soon to set an agenda for opportunities and challenges for the upcoming year.

A motion was made by Tina Peabody to approve the 2022 Annual Report, Rachel Clark seconded. There was no further discussion and was approved by all.

Under new business, Peter gave thanks to the church staff for their talents and dedication. The meeting adjourned in prayer at 11:55 am.
